Principles for QA in the EHEA

- HEIs have primary responsibility for the quality of their provision and its assurance
- QA responds to the diversity of higher education systems, institutions, programmes and students
- QA supports the development of a quality culture
- QA takes into account the needs and expectations of students, all other stakeholders and society

Link between internal and external quality assurance

ESG standard 2.1:

External quality assurance should address the effectiveness of the internal quality assurance processes described in Part 1 of the ESG.

Guidelines

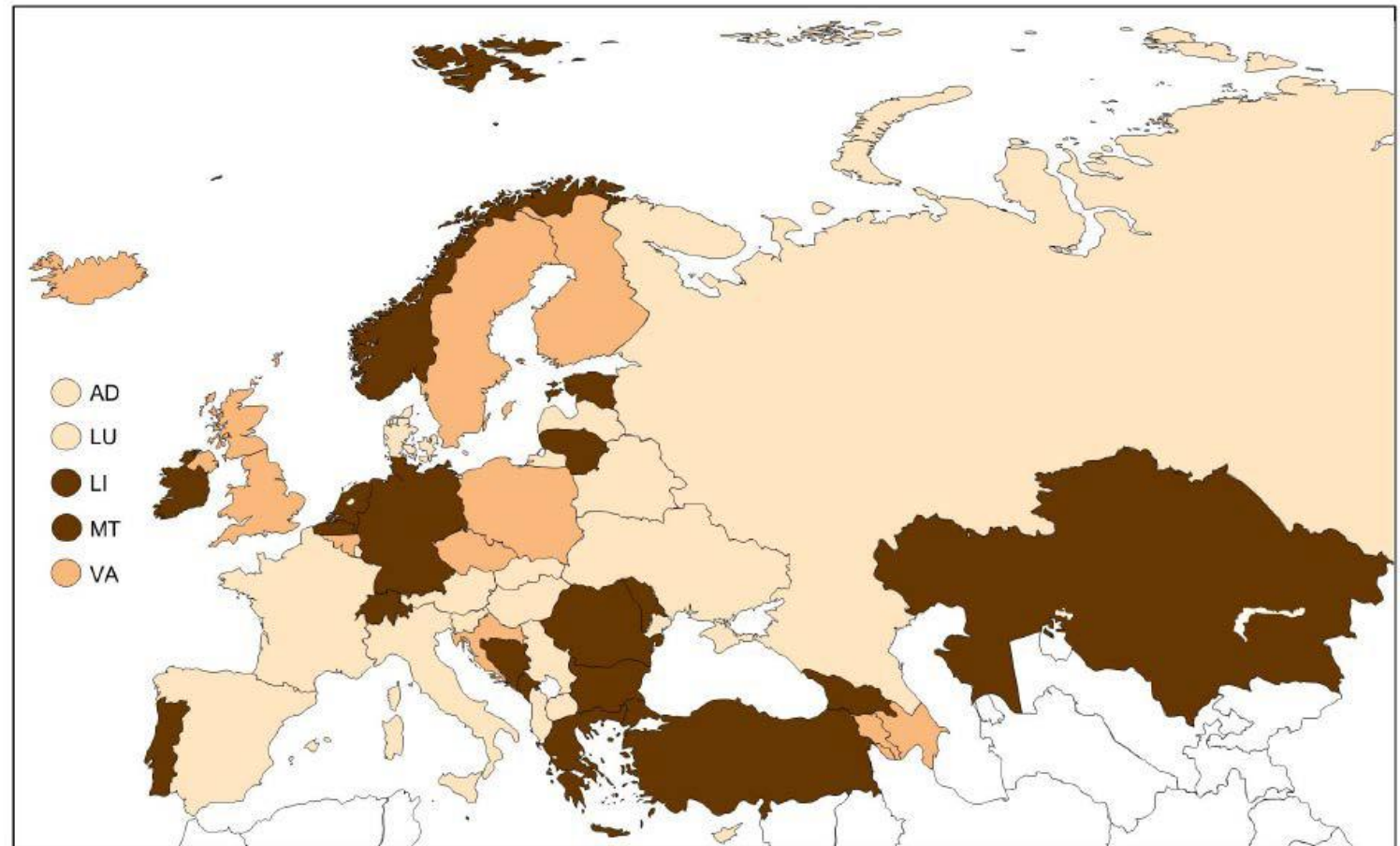
Quality assurance in higher education is based on the institutions' responsibility for the quality of their programmes and other provision; therefore it is important that external quality assurance recognises and supports institutional responsibility for quality assurance. To ensure the link between internal and external quality assurance, external quality assurance includes consideration of the standards of Part 1. These may be addressed differently, depending on the type of external quality assurance.

How does this happen in practice?

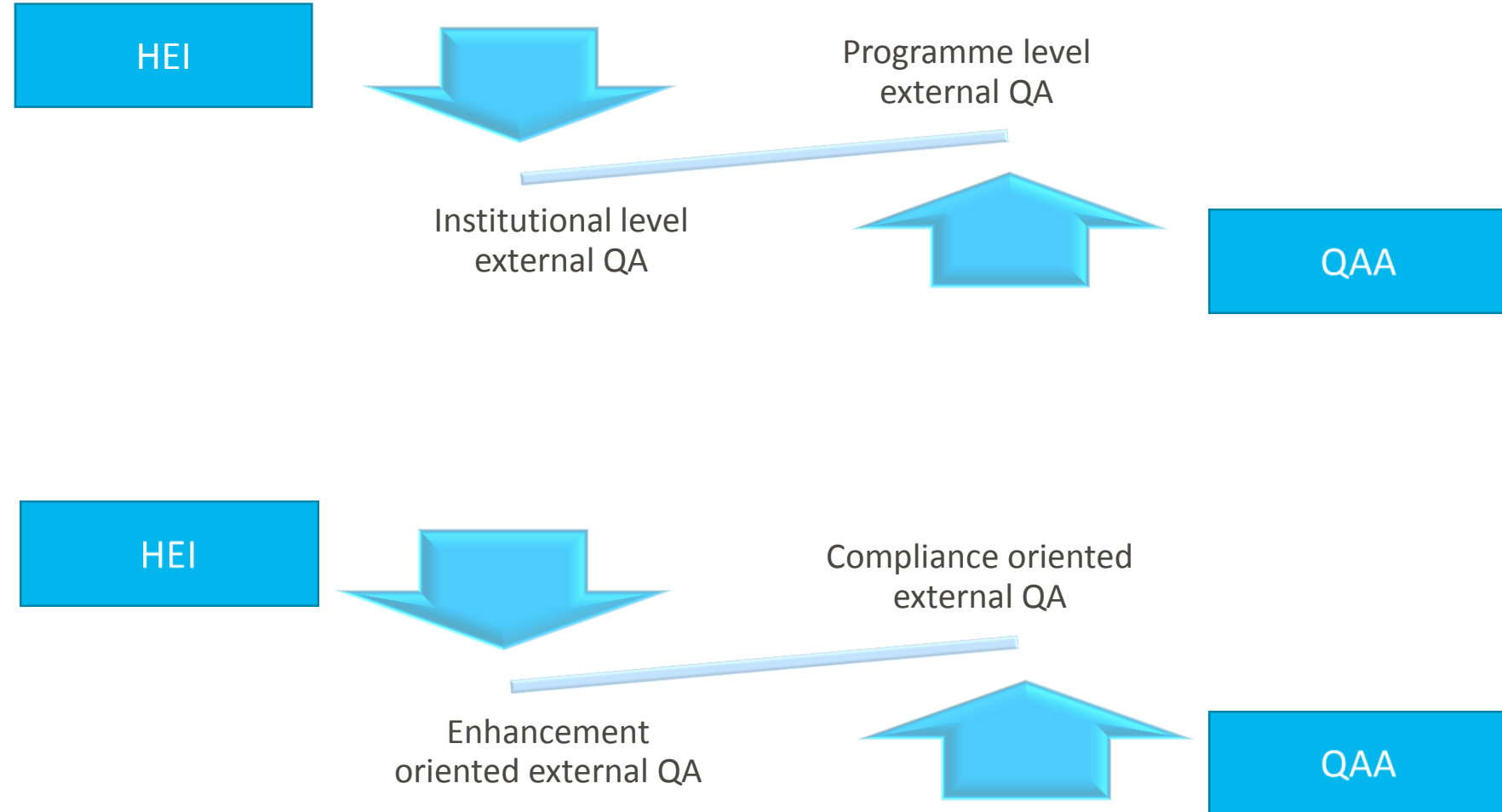

- External QA is required to consider most elements of ESG 2015

Figure 4.4: Requirements for external quality assurance to consider the elements specified in the ESG 2015, 2016/17



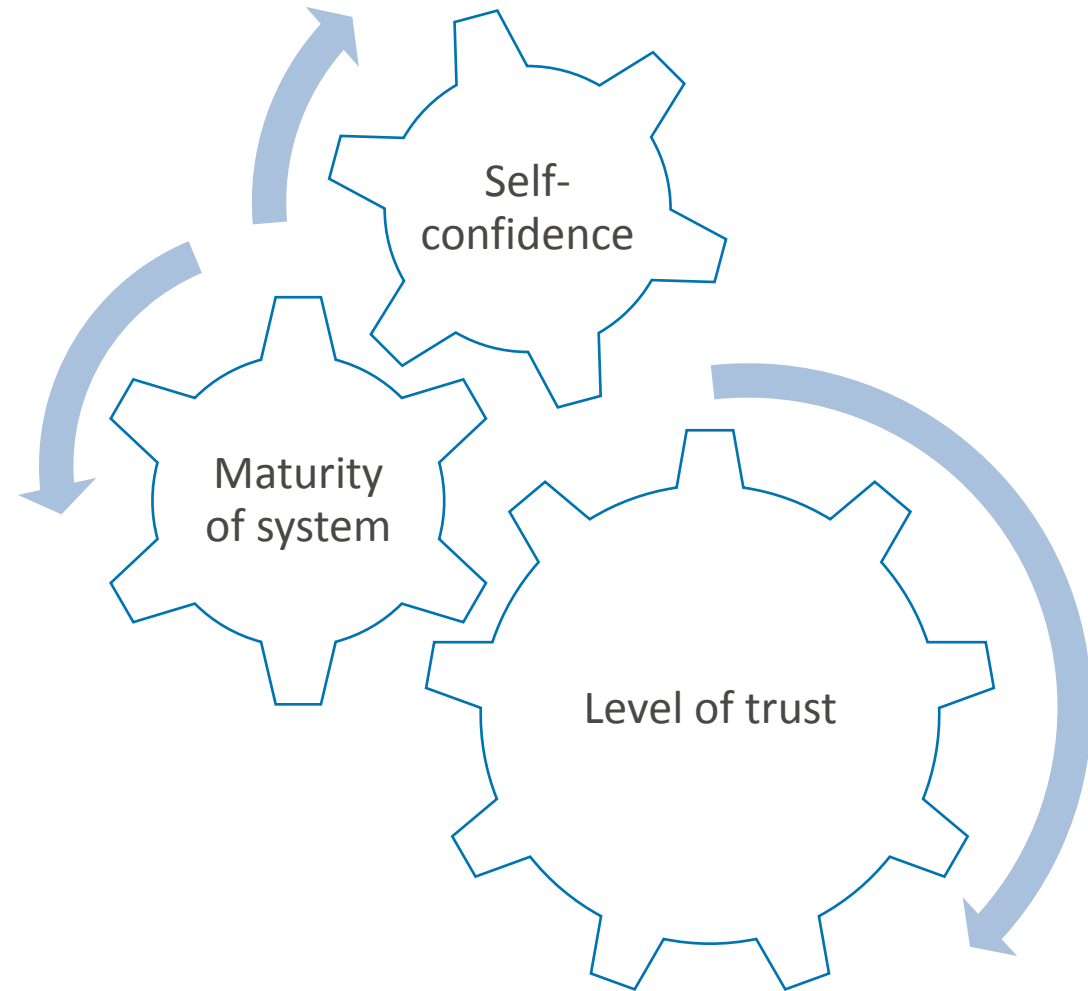
The level of institutional autonomy in choosing internal quality assurance approach varies



Drivers for internal quality assurance

- **Change drivers**
 - Development of external QA systems and demands for accountability
 - Increased competition and collaboration between HEIs
 - Increased cooperation with external (public and private) partners
- **Among the most important changes from institutional leadership perspective**
- **Very strong correlation between internationalisation and QA**
